## Coordinating Conjunctions to Form Compound Sentences

A coordinating conjunction and comma connect two simple sentences to form a compound sentence. The words and, or, but, and so are coordinating conjunctions.

Simple sentences: I like spinach. I don't like kale. Compound sentence: I like spinach, but I don't like kale.

## Coordinating Conjunctions to Form Compound Sentences

The words and, or, but, and so are coordinating conjunctions. They show how the two parts of a compound sentence are related. Always place a comma before a coordinating conjunction in a compound sentence. The comma shows where one thought ends and the other begins.

It will rain today, and it might snow tonight. (and adds information)
Do you want pizza, or would you prefer pasta? (or shows a choice)
I can't go now, but I can go later. (but shows a contrast)
It might snow later, so I'll wear my boots. (so shows a result)
